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What's On

If, like me, our annual accounts make your eyes glaze over, please read on as we have a serious problem.

Basically our accounts can be sub divided into two distinct areas. One is termed 'Capital' which details all income and expenditure incurred in the care and maintenance of our property. The other is termed 'Revenue' which details all income and expenditure incurred in the day to day running of our premises. The 'Capital' side of our budget is in a very healthy state, due mainly to the money accrued from the sale of The North Church and manse, and we have sufficient funds in place to finance all of the work needed now and into the future. The 'Revenue' side of our budget is less healthy despite considerable increases in income from halls' rental and car parking. Put simply our day to day running costs are now showing a projected and continuing annual deficit of around £26,000, which we are currently covering from our reserves (investments income). If this situation is allowed to continue our reserves will dry up in the next few years and we will ultimately incur unsustainable losses in our running costs. We can't transfer funds from Capital to Revenue so what more can we do?

The Kirk Session, at its last meeting, recognised that our church has a long tradition of giving generously to countless worthy causes but also accepted that urgent action was needed to address the current situation. Consequently it was agreed that our emphasis on giving must now be redirected, not wholly but substantially, towards the needs of The Old Parish. In that regard, with immediate effect and for the near future all proceeds from our Saturday and Sunday Tea/Coffee fellowship will go towards addressing our deficit as will the proceeds from our Harvest 'coin in the box' boxes. Harvest Services will continue and our giving will possibly take the form of a retiral offering. All organisations are encouraged to consider organising fund raising activities/events for the church and The Finance Convener and her team will commence planning a longer term fund raising strategy, details of which will be intimated to you in due course. However, due to the ongoing vacancy, a full blown Stewardship Campaign is not envisaged at this stage.

Having read all of this I do hope you realise the serious situation we are in, understand that there is still time to do something about it and perhaps wonder how you can help. We do appreciate your ongoing generosity, however it would be of enormous help if we all now reviewed our personal givings with a view to increasing them where possible. Help and advice on ways to do that can be obtained in the first instance from from the Finance Convener, Marilyn Henderson and our Gift Aid Convener, Nesella Barr.

In closing can I also commend to you Nesella's article on gift aiding your givings. By doing so you will increase your contribution to our church by 25% at no extra cost to you. Please give what I've said prayerful consideration. Our future depends on it.

Gift Aid

In the previous magazine I was able to report that we had received a payment of approximately £19300 from HMRC because many of you have gift aided your offerings. I thought, in this article, I would try to explain how this sum is generated.

The two main methods of giving are through weekly Free Will Offering envelopes and monthly standing orders to our bank acc. Others prefer to donate by annual cheque, standing orders at greater intervals or through the open plate.

All recorded methods can be gift aided, so if the donor is a tax payer, then I can claim back the tax which has already been paid on that donation. At present, that means an additional 25% for our funds so a gift aided giving of £1 per week, for instance, which is £52 over the year is actually worth £65 to the church. Until recently, cash in the plate did not qualify for gift aid but changes in regulations now allow me to claim for cash up to a maximum of £5000 in any year, bringing in an additional £1250.

At present I have 196 signed gift aid declarations for both individual donations and those from couples. Last year 6 of the annual payments by cheque were gift aided as were 50 of the 70 sets of FWO envelopes issued. Analysis of the bank statement shows that 138 of the 149 standing orders were also gift aided. What do these figures tell us? Many of our members are giving regularly and are committed to supporting the work of the church. There can be no doubt about this and if you are in in this group, the office bearers are grateful to you for your support. Here are some questions for others to consider.

1. Are you a tax payer? Can you help us by allowing us to claim the tax on your donations? If yes, then please contact me by telephone, e-mail, via the church office or speak to me at church on a Sunday morning.

2. Have you reviewed your giving recently? This is straightforward if you give through weekly offering envelopes. I have been asked what you need to do if you give by standing order. Unlike direct debits, you have to make the change to a standing order in person at your bank.

3. Do you contribute through the open plate? If so please bear in mind that our income from the open plate beyond £5000 cannot be gift aided so it would be of considerable benefit to us if some of those who used the open plate changed their method of giving and also gift aided their donation. Please give this some consideration. All recorded donations are dealt with confidentially and if you are paying tax, then your contribution can be gift aided.

If anyone has any questions, I would be happy to speak to you at any time.

Recently we received a communication from the Church of Scotland Safeguarding Service including a poster which has to be displayed in church premises. The poster names the Safeguarding Coordinators and how to contact them.
