I'm listening to fireworks, as I write this. People have been setting them off for a number of weeks, since they went on sale. The annual display in Strathclyde park has been cancelled for this year and next, allegedly due to building renovations in the area. Despite increasing legislation curtailing what can and can't be done regarding their purchase and use, they continue to be popular. Though I warrant that many pets and their owners would disagree.

It reminded me of the first time I recollect seeing firework, as a child. We were visiting my grandparents and my dad had acquired some. He was being incredibly safety conscious, keeping us back as he read the instructions, then ran forward to set up a single precious firework, shooing us back again before finally lighting it, then rushing back to us while we all waited for the touchpaper to fizzle away and explode. Rinse and repeat a few laborious times, and then struggling to maintain interest as a catherine wheel was painstakingly attached to my gran's



washing line. It eventually lit, but was singularly unimpressive. The whole experience was a bit of an anti-climax, and nothing like the excitement many years later of the millennium celebrations, with each city attempting to outdo one another with their spectacle!

It struck me as an apposite analogy for much of the change occurring in the church across the whole of Scotland, a small part of which I've had the privilege of engaging with in my role as Interim Moderator in a number of congregations. There has been appropriate engagement, cost counting, and empowerment (Luke 14:28-30). But also, so much effort and care to allay everyone's concerns, to play it safe, and reduce offense. Dotting "I's" and crossing "T's". So much effort and nervous energy expended, that might have otherwise been utilised in the exciting mission of God through his church to all people. I pray that at the final accounting it will not resemble the words of T.S.Elliot's piece, "The Hollow Men", fearing that it "ends, not with a bang but a whimper". Indeed, despite any misgivings we might naturally hold, we each have a responsibility to ensure that it does not, through prayer and action! We trust in God, not the sparks of fireworks (Isa.50:10-11).

However, this country and our church was built on hard work. It was built on the backs of tired people who banded together to make a difference for future generations, and epitomised in the fighting spirit of two world wars and many other conflicts. So, I leave you with this thought: when we consider the mission presented to the church in our generation, what do we identify with and how might we work together to achieve it, for the glory of God and the good of our fellows?

Choir continues to meet on a Wednesday evening at 7.00 in the Session Room and on a Sunday morning prior to worship at 9.50am. We have been pleased to welcome Zoey Gibson to Choir and delighted to have her join the Soprano section.

We have been making good use of the new supplementary hymnary "God Welcomes All" both in choir and also as congregational hymns. Several people have asked about the availability of individual copies of this and I am happy to order at a cost of £27.50.

In early August a Sowne of Organe survey took place in The West campus. This voluntary group present detailed surveys of surviving historic organs in Scotland, including technical and historical overviews, extensive photography from within the Church and organ loft, and recordings of appropriate repertoire. The instrument was built in 1902 by William Hill & Son, London, and the event provided an immense insight into its planning, specification and construction through the various archives and logs which were accessed by them.

The evening culminated in an excellent recital from several organists, and although their programme was restricted by several issues which the organ now has, it proved to be a wonderful evening of music celebrating the life of this historic instrument. The survey will support and direct the musical heritage this instrument has and hopefully reinforce a route for preservation of its historical value.

Last meeting of choir for 2025 will be Wednesday 17th December when all music should be returned. We will resume on Wednesday 14th January at 7.00 p.m.
