"Full Steam Ahead"

Recently, I was talking to our friend and Elder Bill Wilson about the SS Politician and the film "Whiskey Galore". It struck a chord, given that I'm from the Western Isles and had spent many a happy hour driving boats around the coast and scuba diving under the crystal clear waters of those isles. But it also got me thinking about boats, and the inevitable difficulties that can be incurred in navigating the sea and shores.

So much of life can feel like travelling the seas. We have our ups and downs. We need to make course corrections, often by consulting the charts and compass of scripture and the unseen guest who swings the needle in the direction we need to go. We experience this in our daily lives, our

church life, and also in the life of the wider church. The latter, of course, is weathering some intense storms, and we are not immune from that in Hamilton. We trust that some clarity will be gained as the clouds lift in the very near future.

Of course, if a boat is to be seaworthy it needs a sound hull. It also needs good engines if it is to get under steam, whatever the mode of power. We could draw analogies to our



individual and congregational Christian life. But, we also appreciate the need of our tangible resources in having a church building that allows us to worship together and from which to exercise the mission of God in our town. It is with some concern, then, that I need to draw to your attention another kind of "steam" that has the potential to restrict our progress.

Recently I intimated the poor condition of the church boilers. In exploring the issue, it was of intense historic interest to find an underground coal bunker and oil tank as well as the expected defunct gas boilers in the basement of the church. Needless to say, the environmental risk of oil spillage necessitates the removal of more equipment than originally expected. However, the proposal to replace the boilers is progressing nicely, having gone out to tender. Already well over £10,000 has been pledged to the Project Fund. We are also exploring what might be done next year to improve our environmental footprint. I hope that we might have a congregational meeting sometime soon, to discuss this matter further.

This is just one more of the vagaries of life, to which we are all subject. However, we trust that God continues with us as we weather the storms, under the captaincy of our Lord Jesus. I trust and pray that we might all pull together in our collective church life to support one another in everything we experience so that we might travel full steam ahead in His service.

Finance and Gift Aid

The Word for the world

The Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme allows us to claim tax back on donations of £30 or less up to £8,000 from sources where no gift aid declarations are in place. These can be from the plate, donations or from Weekly Freewill Offerings. This year we were able to claim £1,450.75 on donations of £5,803.

As you will have heard from the minister in the pulpit, the cost of replacing the boiler in the church is going to cost around £75,000. This work is badly needed to heat the church to a suitable temperature. A project fund has been set up to help raise some of the money required and we already have donations in excess of £10,500. In doing this we may also be able to apply for grants for some of the work. In the past when projects like this were being undertaken grants were not available as we were not raising any funds ourselves and at the time of writing this is being looked into. Any donations can be handed into the office, to the minister or myself.

How many little proverbs, or sayings can you remember - perhaps from your childhood? The book of Proverbs, written mostly by Solomon, is a book of thought provoking pronouncements, principles and teachings. Each one intended to encourage the reader to live a Godly life.

"A problem shared is a problem halved" is another saying we're all familiar with. We know the value of talking things over with others; often getting a different perspective. What, however, if there's no-one to share your problem with. For the Christian, there's always someone. We should never forget we always have someone to share our problems with - Jesus himself. In Philippians 4:5-7 we read "Let your reasonableness be known to everyone. The Lord is at hand; do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and thanksgiving let your requests be known to God."
