
Dear friends,

“In a Topsy-Turvy World”

Having young children, I was recently reading them some of the Mr. Men books. It reminded me that my mother purchased the originals as each was published, to read to me and my siblings. My eye lit upon the ninth in the series, “Mr. Topsy-Turvy”, which is the story of a character who did everything backwards and upside down. For example, he read books upside down, from the back to the front. Now, I know some people like to read a restaurant menu from right to left, starting with the price, or read the dessert menu before the main course, but this was different again. While it often feels like we live in a topsy turvy-world, it also got me to thinking about our spiritual lives, and the way we often go about things as Christ’s church.

The normal procedure in life is that you work hard to acquire money to pay for goods, which are often discarded after a period of wear and tear. Yet the Christian message is that something eternal has been purchased for us, which we only need to receive as a free gift. We then set about working, as a response to the love shown to us in the first place. Likewise, the Gospels tell us that the Jesus who is our judge did not come to condemn but to save (John 3:17), and that the King of Glory came, not to be served but to serve (Mark 10:45). That is somewhat topsy-turvy.

Similarly, with the church: we put prayer before action, devotion to God before devotion to our works, and service out of love rather than compulsion or personal gain (2Cor.9:7). Or at least, that is how it is supposed to work. Perhaps, like me, you are not convinced that we always get things the right way around. When our church structures are an end to themselves; or our pride or privilege or sense of embarrassment are more important than our opportunities to talk about Christ and his church; or our fixation with the immediate concerns causes us to forget that we are part of an unbroken chain of Christianity with eternity in view - perhaps it is us that have sometimes got it back to front from the way it ought to be. Yet, Jesus does not leave his church without a challenge or two.



As the early Christians visited towns, it was claimed that they “turned the world upside down” with their teaching (Acts 17:6). In the story of Mr. Topsy-Turvy, he visits our town, and then disappears... but not without leaving behind a legacy. Everybody starts talking topsy-turvy. On the final page, we’re left with the challenge: “Can you think of something to say that’s topsy turvy? Go on, try!”.

Paul – A Man Changed Forever

Drama Kirk's lockdown bible studies continue in 2021 with a closer look at the man who did so much to shape the Christian church – the Apostle Paul. A series of seven studies is planned, taking us from Saul's childhood, through his conversion and into the missionary trips and letters that comprised his ministry.

The studies on Paul were suggested in feedback on the 2020 studies. Other developments planned for the studies include an opportunity to hear the relevant passages of scripture read at the start of the study – or indeed to read them beforehand yourself.

This year's Passion Play will be presented on YouTube on Saturday 3rd April at 2pm. Titled “With Arms Wide Open” it tells the story of the passion from Luke's perspective. We are currently working with writer Peggy Barnell to develop the script for use under the current restrictions, before filming commences with our wonderful community cast and a small team of professionals.

Drama Kirk in 2021

Analysing activity for 2020, it was clear that the audiences were significantly higher for the online events than they would have been for in person events, that the audience was coming from further afield and that (in general) people preferred the less interactive format for the studies.

Reporting back to our funders, GoForIt, on our second year of activity was completed in December and we are delighted to say we have received our third year of funding. Taking receipt of this commits us to continuing to bring the Gospel to life through drama, despite the current restrictions.

Our governance committee and steering group continue to meet virtually and have planned a virtual programme of activity for the first six months of 2021. Planning for the remainder of the year will take place once there is further clarity on ongoing restrictions.

The Committee is grateful to those who – despite the challenges – are giving their time and talents to sharing the Gospel through Drama Kirk, and to everyone who is supporting them.



FINANCE

At the time of writing, the 2020 accounts are being finalised and will be presented to the Trustees on 9th March for approval. The date of the Annual Stated Meeting is 21st March.

The Gift Aid claim for 2020 has been submitted and paid by HMRC. The total gift aided income was **£83,570.70** which gave us a refund of tax amounting to **£20,892.68**. This is a drop from last year due to the impact on offerings as the church was closed for most of the year.

The table below shows a breakdown of the different elements included in the return along with the previous years' figures for comparison. If you have any questions or would like any further information on the figures, please do not hesitate to contact me.

At present we have 172 declarations in place representing 234 members. In addition we have one non-member contributing to Drama Kirk on a monthly basis by standing order. If you pay tax and would like to contribute extra to the church at no cost to yourself, please speak to me. For every £1.00 you contribute HMRC will refund us 25p of the tax you have already paid. Also, if you stop paying tax or change your address it is important that you let me know.

Unfortunately, this year we will not be able to claim tax under the Gift Aid Small Donation Scheme where we can claim tax back on donations of £30 or less without declarations being in place. This was usually donations put into the open plate but again, with the closure of the church, this will not be possible.

Many thanks to everyone involved in the finances of the congregation, including yourselves, for your commitment in supporting God's work in the church locally and nationally especially during this difficult time.

Hyzone Limited

Hyzone is a relational youth project committed to the needs of young people who choose to engage. They have concern for the development of the whole person and seek to encourage young people to reach their physical, emotional, mental and spiritual potential so that they may find life in all its fullness, whatever form that might take for them. This work is undertaken by a Project Manager and is supported by a sessional team and volunteers.

Funding is provided by a secured Grant from the National Lottery Community Fund Young Start Fund and financial contributions from Hamilton Old Parish Church, St John's Church and St Mary's Episcopal. This funding support continues with no penalties in view of the current restrictions although future core funding will be difficult to source but every effort is being made to explore every resource. Small donations also assist and are greatly appreciated.

Covid restrictions have impacted as the premises remain closed however Hyzone remains in regular contact with a small core of young people via Instagram and mobile calls. Several walks with young people on Sunday afternoons around the local parks have proved successful but again is dependent on current Covid guidelines. Hyzone will continue to assist and support young people to be positive both about themselves and their future.


