"Location, Location, Location"

What kind of journeys do you like to make? Is it the simple kind, to work or some pastime activity, to church, or for some messages; or is it the larger kind, to exotic locations around the world? For some, these are places of adventure, for others, it's a chance to relax. So many people are taking the opportunity to travel, now that restrictions have been lifted, after memories of the longest journey being between their living room and the kitchen, or up to bed. Lockdown may just have increased our appreciation for our journeys, whatever the scale.

Last Tidings I talked about times and seasons, and this time I would like to talk about place and memory. It seemed an appropriate topic after finally having been able to visit Oberammergau,

this year - a journey with which many others will have familiarity. We travelled by car, and the journey there and back again enabled us to visit ten different countries. Yet, for me, the highpoint (pun not intended) was rounding a corner in the Austrian Alps and seeing a crystal clear lake reflecting the mountain tops and forests. I could have stayed there forever – yet we couldn't stop as it



was the day of the Passion Play. We could record and memorise it, we could give thanks in appreciation, but we had to move on yet carry something of it with us.

How many times in life have we wanted to freeze a moment in time? A precious memory, of a place, a family member, a special occasion, a smile, or even a grumpy retort that summed up someone we love. Our sense of time and place and person are often wrapped up with the sounds, smells, and emotions of that precious moment. In the midst of the years, and in the scale of eternity, it was a small but beautiful punctuation mark in the journey of our lives.

Whether at home, or as we return to our regular journeys to the sacred space that we find in our church building and with the church: our worshipping community, our church, our people, the family of God – I hope that we might take the opportunity to hold our precious moments up to God. In all the hilltops and valleys that we have experienced in life, we have so much to share and to appreciate and for which to be thankful. As Paul wrote, "Be thankful in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1Thess.5:18).

After a busy three years completing our commitments to our GoForIt funded project, Drama Kirk may have less activity planned for this year but are still very much looking forward to identifying opportunities.

One such event is likely to be a celebration of the 250th anniversary of East Kilbride Old Parish Church which will see Drama Kirk involved in a very different kind of Sunday service...more in due course!



Over the summer we have had opportunity as a family to enjoy a couple of brilliant but very different pieces of biblical drama.

The first was of course Oberammergau, which was a wonderful experience. As fabulous as it was (and we loved so much about it; how beautifully the Old Testament tableaux were interwoven with Jesus' story, the role of the choir, the scale of cast, the thorough coverage of the events of that fateful week) what struck

me more than anything was the sense of commitment from the community. From the houses painted for different characters, to what was sold in the shops, how the village was arranged and of course the number of people involved – this is a town where Jesus is visible all year round. Part of the town's DNA.

We then travelled to Lincoln to see their mystery cycle, which depicted parts of scripture from creation (told through a series of footballs) to a very simple but heartfelt Passion. They did not aim for a realistic depiction of events but instead explored creative tellings. What struck me was how engaged our boys were (and I don't think it was just because of Satan's naughty language). The simplified and humorous ways of sharing the stories really engaged them.



Both of these experiences have led me to ponder how we develop our fresh expression of church. How do we root what we do in mission, led by and for our local community? How can we use Drama Kirk to ensure Jesus is visible in Hamilton? And how do we continue to create and play, in order to share the gospel in a creative and engaging way, for audiences old and new?

Finance

In 2019 the General Assembly demanded a new system be put in place for funding the Ministry and Mission of the church to leave more money with congregations for mission. It was felt that the old system was a mystery to most people and not transparent enough and seen as an income tax which just kept going up. From January 2023 a new scheme called Giving to Grow is to start which is designed to be open, transparent and easy to understand.

In the past the national church calculated how much money was needed for its work which had to be approved by the General Assembly and a scale was used to assess the amount due from congregations to pay for the work. This scale was calculated on a three-year rolling average of a congregation's income. In a radical change the amount of money actually raised will be used to plan and budget for posts and work plans and will only be done when funding is available. The calculation will now be based on the most recent available year e.g. the 2023 assessment will be based on 2021 income. This means the assessment will be more responsive to changing circumstances.

This will hopefully mean a reduction in our contribution to the national church and leave more money with ourselves for mission work.

At the moment our income is still in excess of our expenditure and we are fortunate that our gas and electricity contracts are fixed until next year.
